



Acceleration in Studies


Success in the Future
















Spirited Students Add Pep to Game



"Oldies" Keep "L" Club Alive


Although the traditional "L" Club initiation was dispensed with this year and the club did not initiate any new members, the former members kept the organization alive.






Awards Presented at FFA Banquet


Tigers End '68 Season 6-3-1


The Tiger Defense held their opponents to an average of only 7.8 points per game.


Top Star receivers for the season were Steve Miller with 12; David West, 10; and Charles Miller, 6.






Luverne High Nine Finish Season 7-6












Sophomores

Exercises Feature Gifts, Gann, Stone Commencement Exercise


