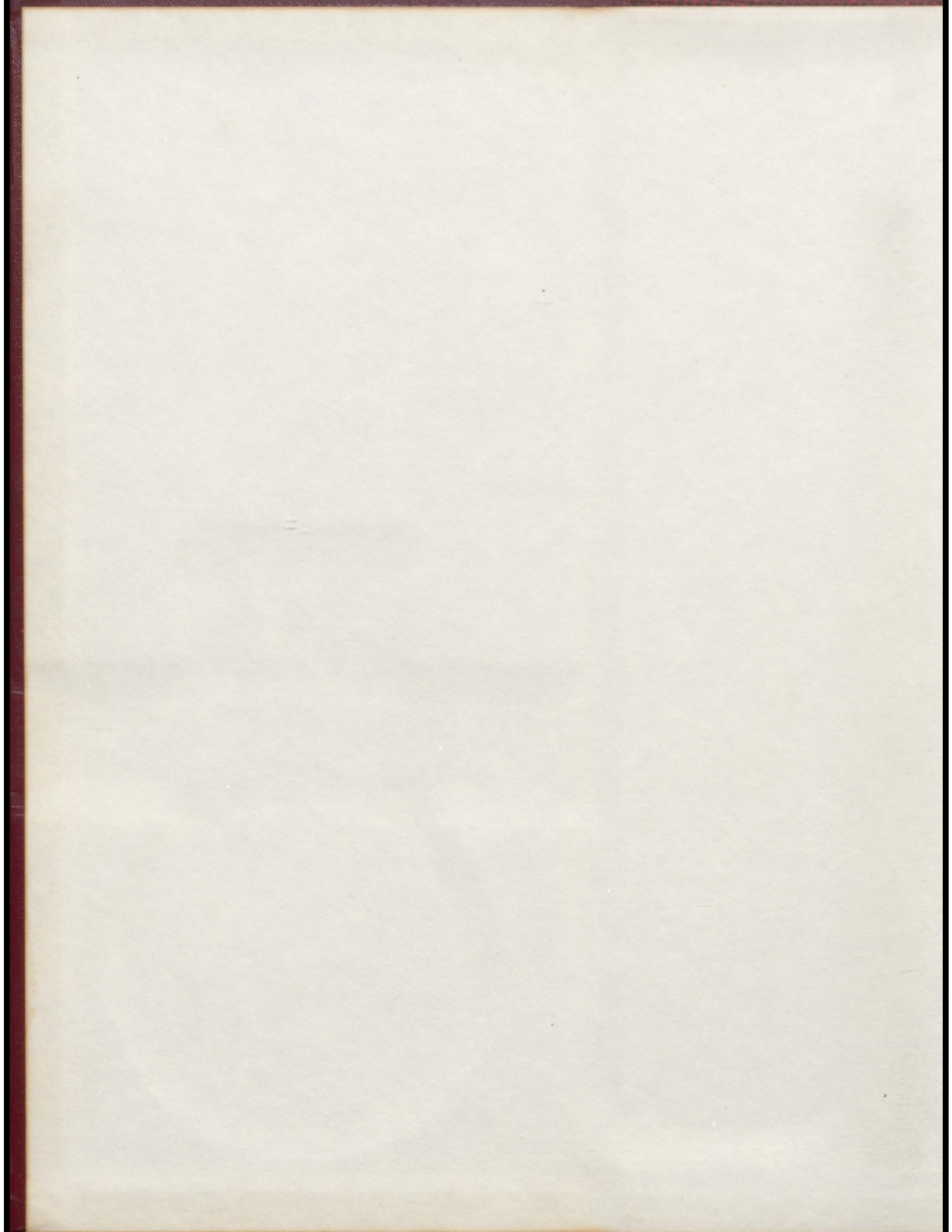
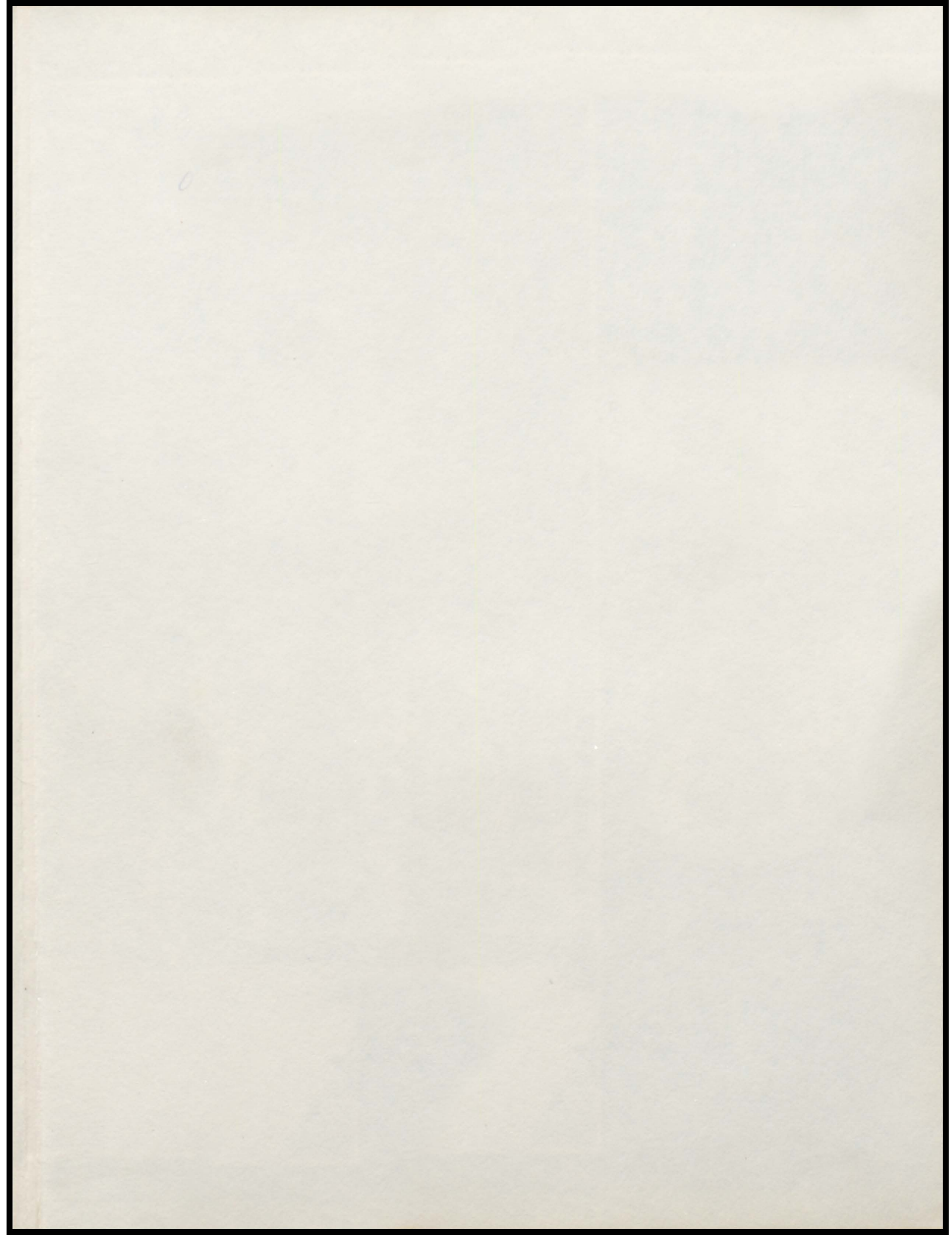


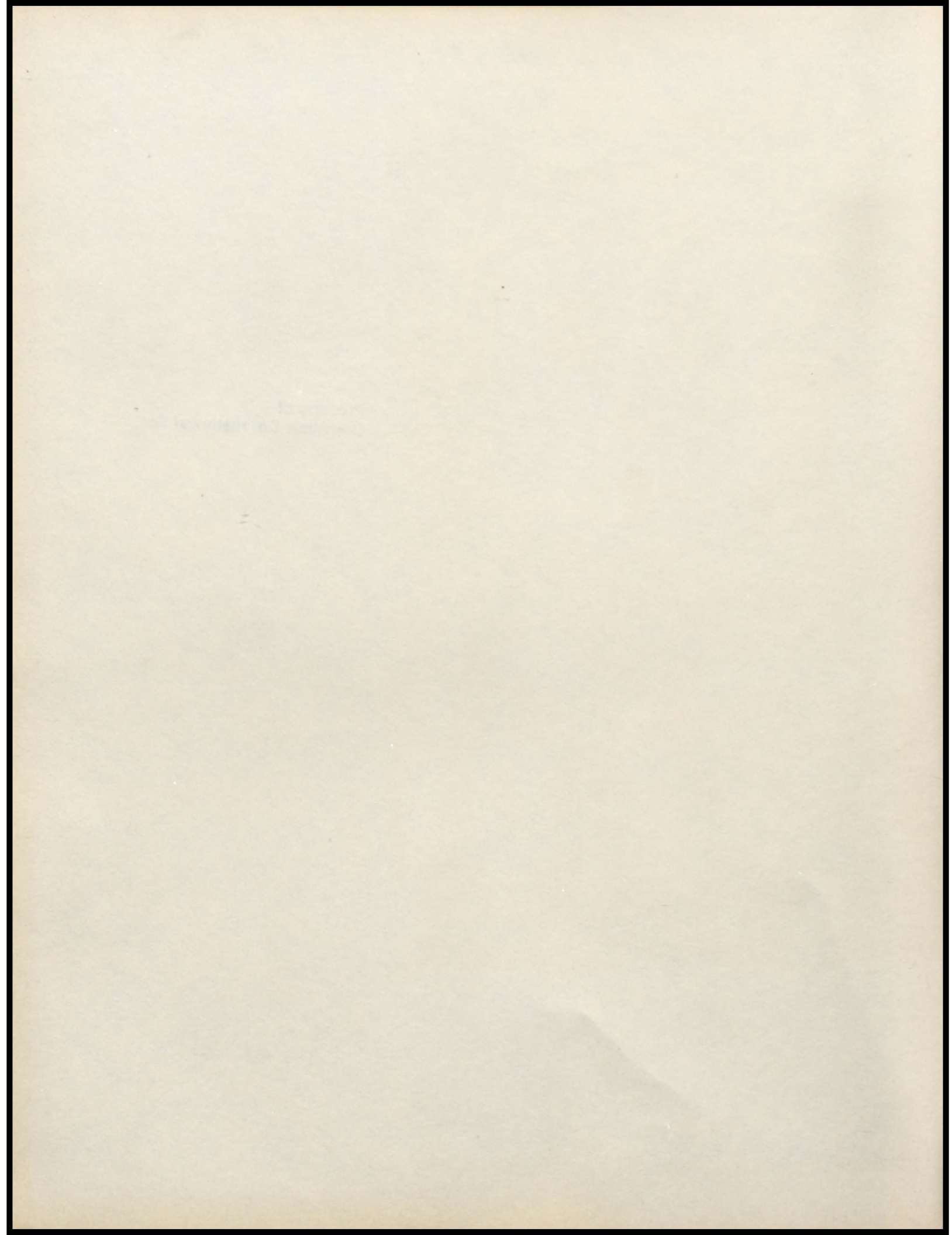

A Fall Happening

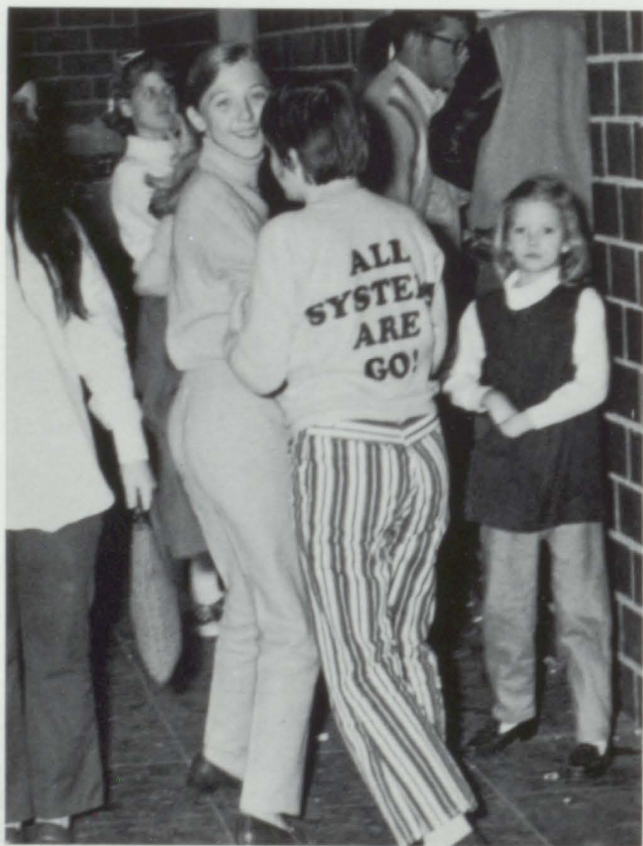

"All systems ARE go" as LHS enters its 1969-1970 Winter Happening, whether it be athletics, academics, or just plain fun.

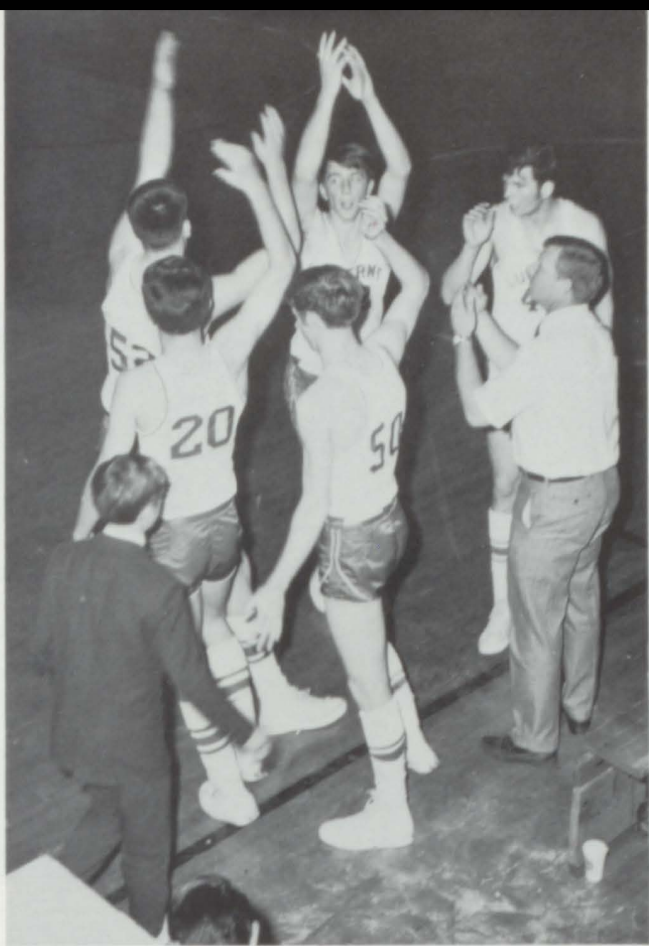
Winter is a time of rest for no one with mid-term exams, basketball practices, basketball games, club meetings and activities, assembly programs, homework, and Christmas Holidays.

Baseball also adds excitement to the spring activities at LHS.





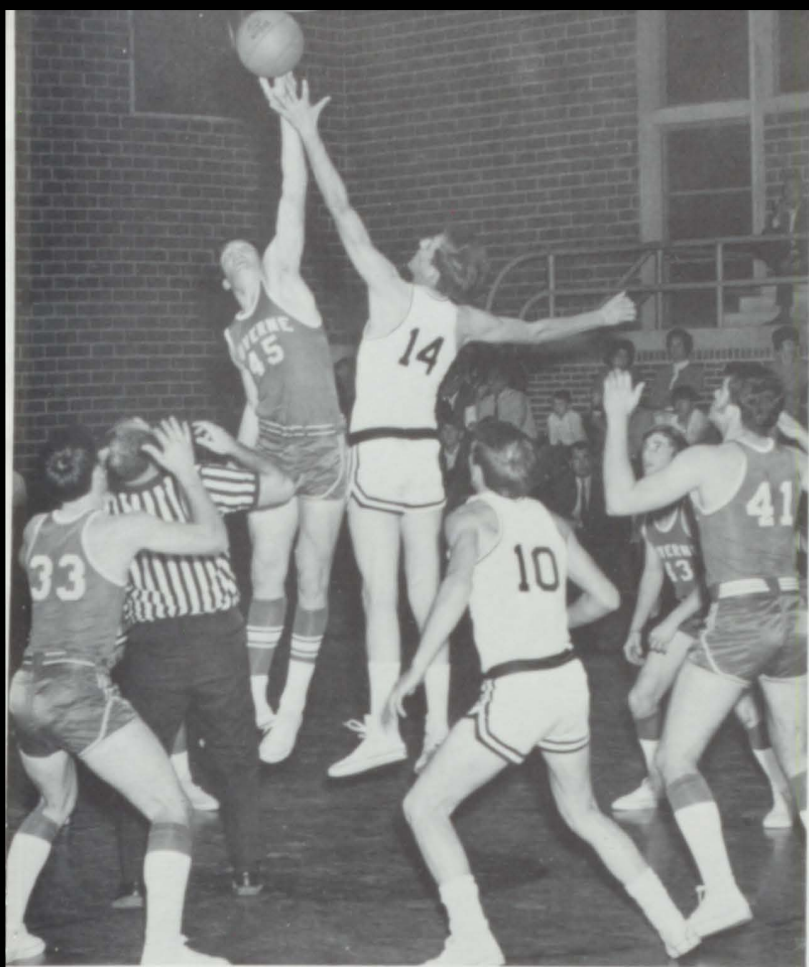
A Year-Round Happening

Graduation---A Great Happening

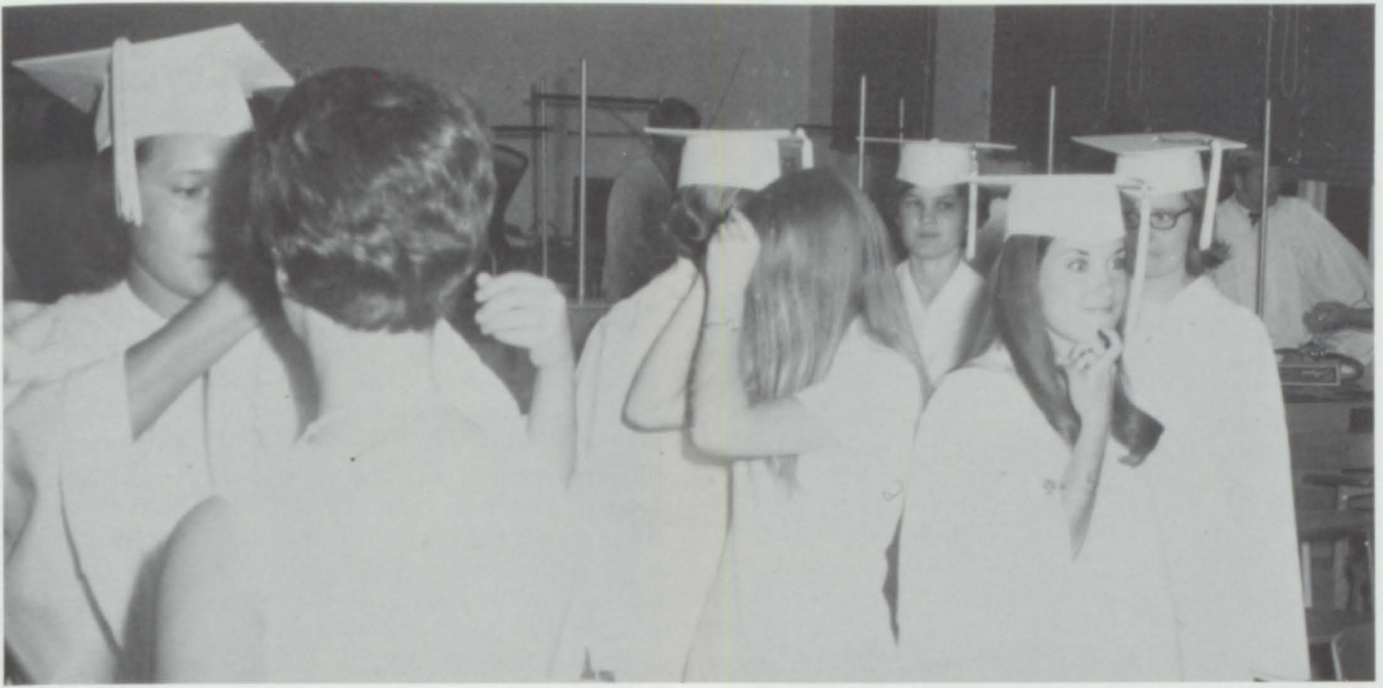

The 1969 mighty offensive team progressed continually throughout the tough grid season. The offense was dependent upon the terrific blocking percentages which never got below fifty percent the entire year. This was the best job every done by a Luverne Tiger offensive line. Joe Petrey received two stars for highest percentage with both grades in the top eighties. Butch Norman also received two high-percentage stars.

The mighty Tigers started the season with a relatively inexperienced backfield, but much improvement was seen as the season progressed. The main problem for the backs was deciding which big hole to go into after the tough line had cleared opposing defenses away.

The Tiger offense scored 196 points total to its opponents 92. The team pushed forward to rack up 120 first downs to the opposition's 88 FD's. The offense's forward drives added up to 2003 yards rushing while the defense held to 1024 rushing yards. The Tigers took to the air to move 570 yards to their more experienced opponents 740 yards.

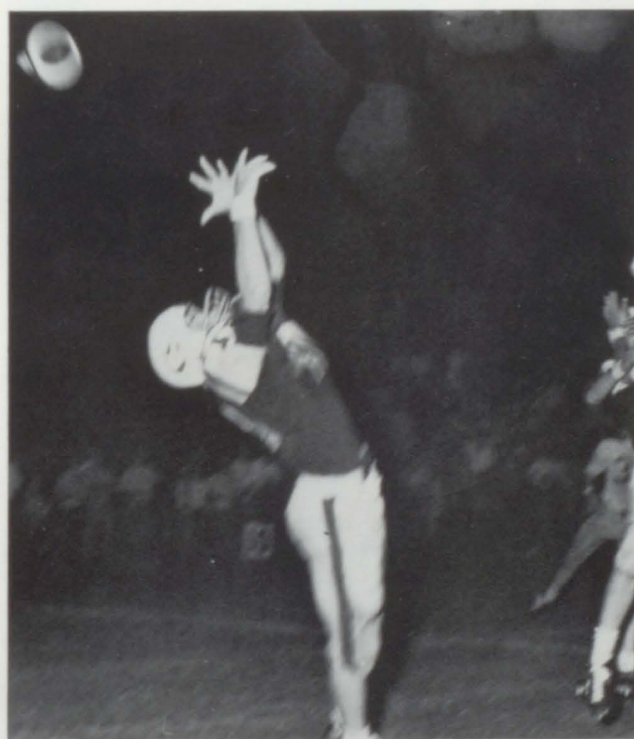

When the offense scored or couldn't get the ball moving the mighty Tiger defense moved in to stop the rival offensive squad. The eleven maned defensive squad racked up over 350 crushing tackles. Freddie Jeffcoat was the leading headache to the opposing backs as he compiled 126 unassisted tackles. Mike Norman was second with 85 tackles. Rick Morgan held down the passing attacks of the opposing teams as he brought down six aerials thrown to rival receivers. Freddie Jeffcoat also brought down four passes from his linebacker position.

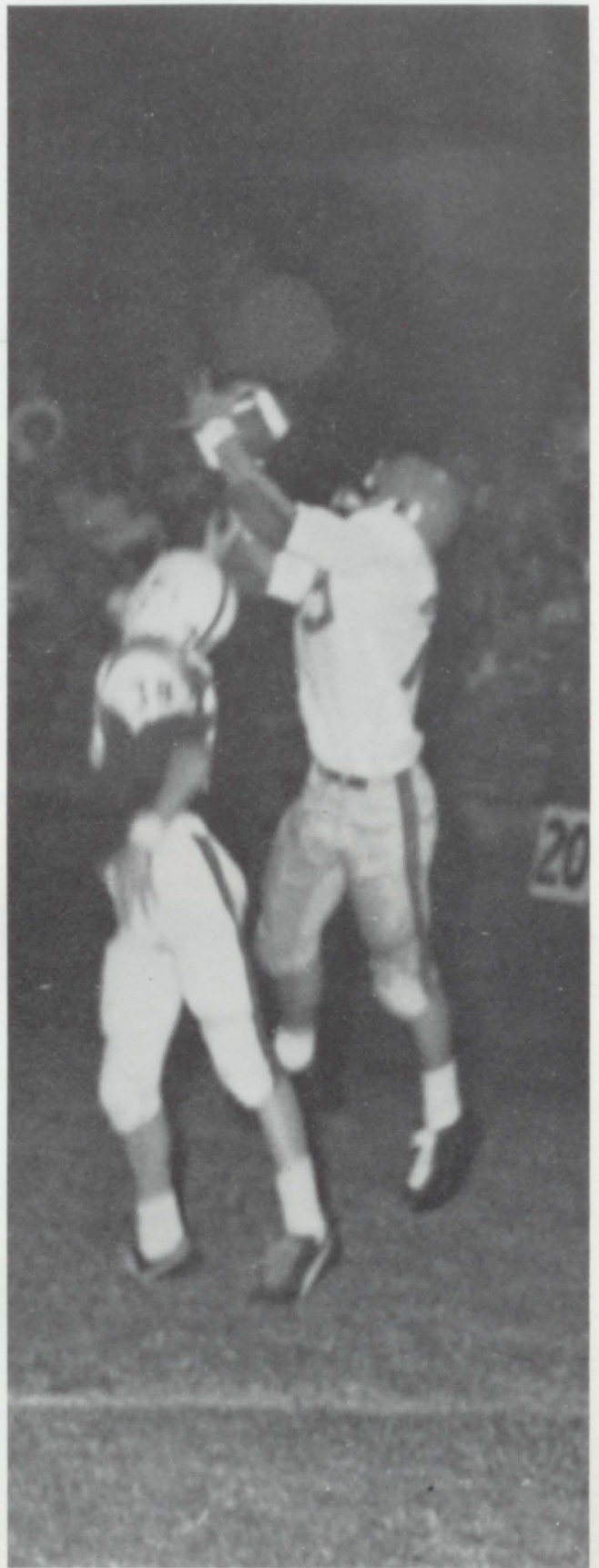
The Tiger Defensive line held the enemy infantry ground-attacks to only 1024 yards rushing and 88 first downs, while the defensive backfield stopped the enemy artillery from driving only 740 yards into our territory.

Tigers end season as SAC 2A Champs with victorious 6-3-1 record.

The Tigers begin their season with a victory over Georgiana with a score of 8-0. Georgiana backs were continuously harassed by the Tiger version of the pro-style blitz exhibited by Keith Jayroe, Starling Haire, and the remaining defensive line. The Tigers blitzed on three successive plays and dumped the panther quarterback for a loss on each of them. The game was almost close as Morgan fumbled on the Tiger 18-yard line and three Georgiana men were there to recover on the ten. But the big Red's linemen, determined not to be scored upon, caused a fumble on 4th down at the goal line stripe.

On September 12, the Luverne Tigers journeyed down to Elba Country and returned with a 1-1 record. Luverne's defense allowed 310 yards on the ground by Elba's backs while the Luverne backfield was only able to pick up a 100 yards rushing. Butch Norman recovered an Elba fumble on their 20 yard line to set up Luverne's only touchdown. It seems that the only bright spot in the entire night for the Luverne Tigers was the brilliant point-of-attack blocking by the Luverne line.

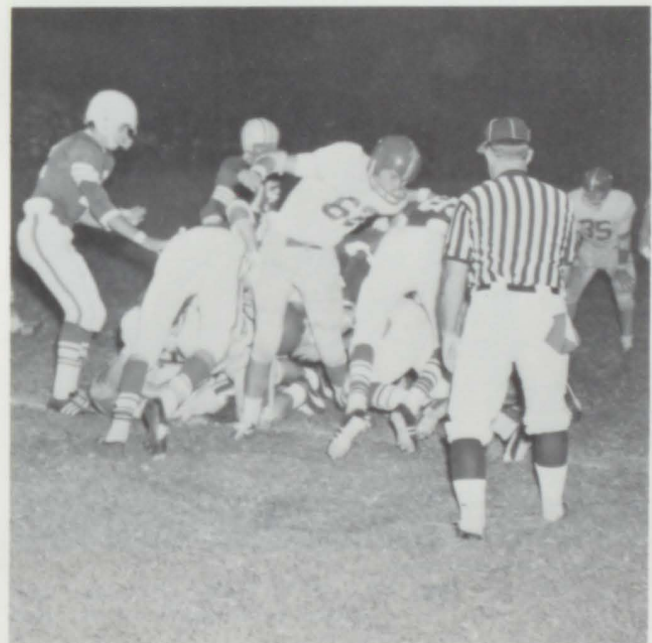
After a hard week of tough, but spirited, practices, Luverne traveled to Andalusia to be met by a rain storm. The spirit of the team was slightly dampened during the thirty minute postponement, but the mighty Tigers were still hungry for victory. Coach Glenn Daniel's Tigers played an outstanding defensive game throughout the night; while the offensive squad came up with key first downs. The wet field definitely hindered the Tigers running game. The statistics looked something like this after first half: First Downs — Tigers-4, Andy-5; Punts — Tigers-2, Andy-3; Passes — Tigers-3, Andy-1. After swapping drivers all night long, the dreary, wet Luverne Tigers walked off the field and carried home a 0-0 tie for the records.

The Luverne Tigers, having been rained out of a victory in Andalusia, came back to their home field and trounced upon the Brantley Bulldogs. The Luverne Tigers' Offensive Machine exploded and racked up 6 touchdowns and a fieldgoal as they rolled pass Brantley by a score of 41-6. Luverne scored in every quarter of play — 4 T.D.'s on the ground; 2 via the air; a fieldgoal; and 2 extra points to amass 41 points in the game. Brantley scored their 6 points in the second period.

The Luverne Tigers journeyed to Highland Home confident of a victory over the Flying Squadron. Their expectations were deflated early in the 1st quarter when a Squadron defensive back intercepted a pass and galloped 28 yards unmolested into the end zone. It infuriated the visiting Tigers and when the gridiron warfare was ended, Luverne had inflicted a wrathful 39-6 shellacking on Highland Home.

The LHS Tigers racked up victory number four by running over the Samson Tigers 48-0 in a homecoming mis-match. Luverne scored in every frame, getting two touchdowns in the first, one in the second, two in the third, and two in the fourth. Not only was victory shown on the score-board but also in the statistics: First downs, Luverne 16, Samson 3; Yards Rushing, Luverne 339, Samson 7; and Yards Passing, Luverne 50, Samson 45.

The Aggies put a total of 16 points on the score board, however, that is kind of mis-leading as to the type of game played. On a punt, Fred Jeffocat boomed one out and the Tigers recovered the ball deep in Aggie-land. The Tigers, sensing their opportunity had come, was stopped dead at the 1-yard line by the linemen of Evergreen. This was Luverne's second loss of the season and gives the Tigers a 4-2-1 slate with three games remaining to be played.

The LHS Tigers led 18-0 at half-time and the Bulldogs from Brundidge came storming back to make an interesting fight of it during the second half before losing 24-12. This was the Tiger's fifth victory of the year, against two defeats and one tie. The defensive unit of Luverne was a thorn in the side for Brundidge as they came up with the key pass interception and fumbles at crucial times. The offensive unit opened gate after gate to make possible two outstanding runs for Lowery for 85 and 91 yards.

Coach Glenn Daniel's Tigers of LHS appear to get better as the season draws to an end. In Florala they won their 6th game of the 1969 slate over the Wildcats, 28-6. Fred Jeffcoat drew first blood for the Tigers by scoring a touchdown on a 15-yard run. Harold Lowery came back to continue the scoring for the Tigers to put them out front 12-0 in the first quarter. Doug Brown, running in the full-back slot, scored T. D. no. 3, for Luverne on the 7-yard run and Daniel Free kicked the point-after to make the score 19-6. Luverne's last touchdown of the night came when Q. B. Edward Speed passed 8 yards to End Warren Jackson and after the PAT kick by Free, Luverne had a comfortable 20-point lead. The Tigers' defensive unit was responsible for two points on a safety when Butch Norman hemmed the Florala quarterback behind the goal line and dumped him to make the final score 28-6.

In a lost of 12-0 to Greenville, it seemed Luverne's only bright spot was an offensive march from the Tigers' own 4-yard line to Greenville's 3-yard line. The 93-yard sustained drive by Luverne got underway when Speed picked up 2 back-to-back 1st downs of runs of 14 and 12 yards. He hit Daniel Free with a 9-yard pass for another Tiger 1st down. End Butch Norman, triple-covered, reached high for a perfectly thrown aerial by Speed and tucked the ball away as he was brought down by four Greenville Tigers. The pass play nitted 35 yards in the drive.

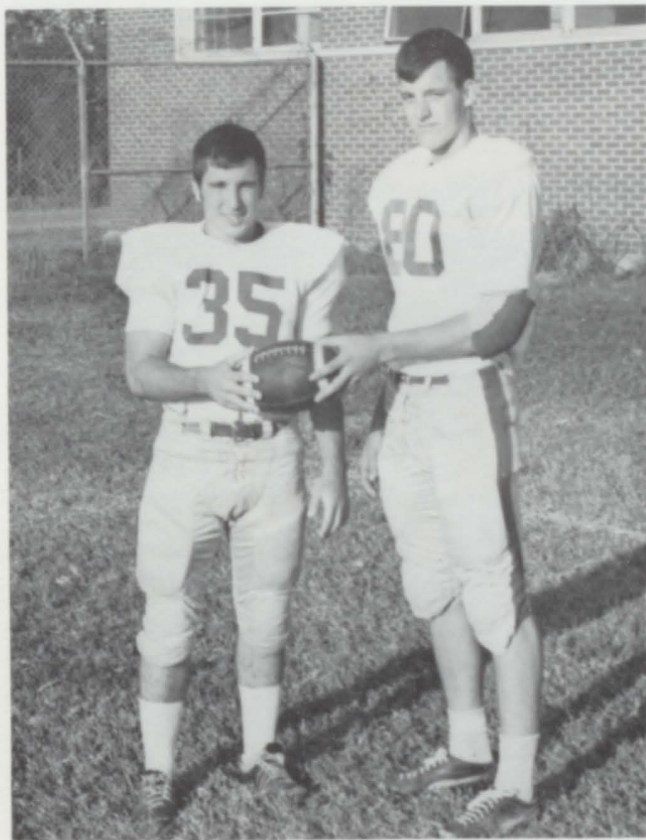

Junior Varsity Football Team

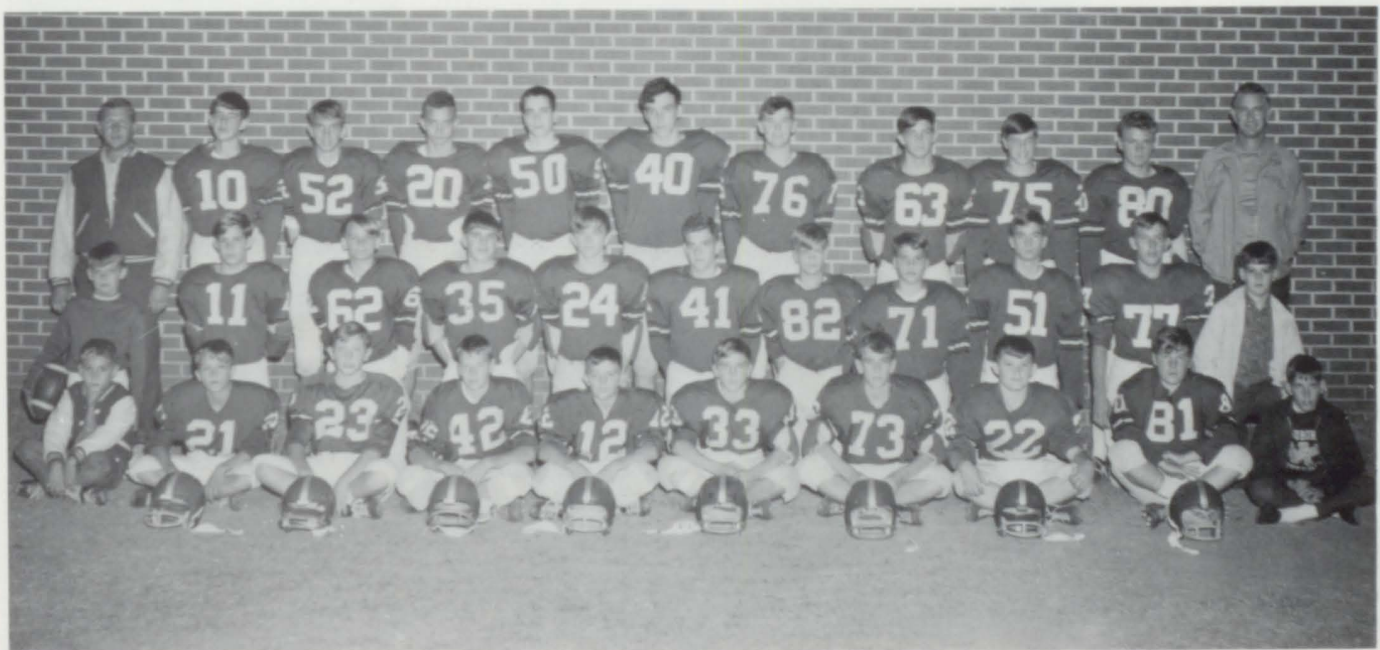

The Varsity and Junior Varsity teams opened school the first day with a pep rally. This began a year of practice, pep rallies, games, and dances.

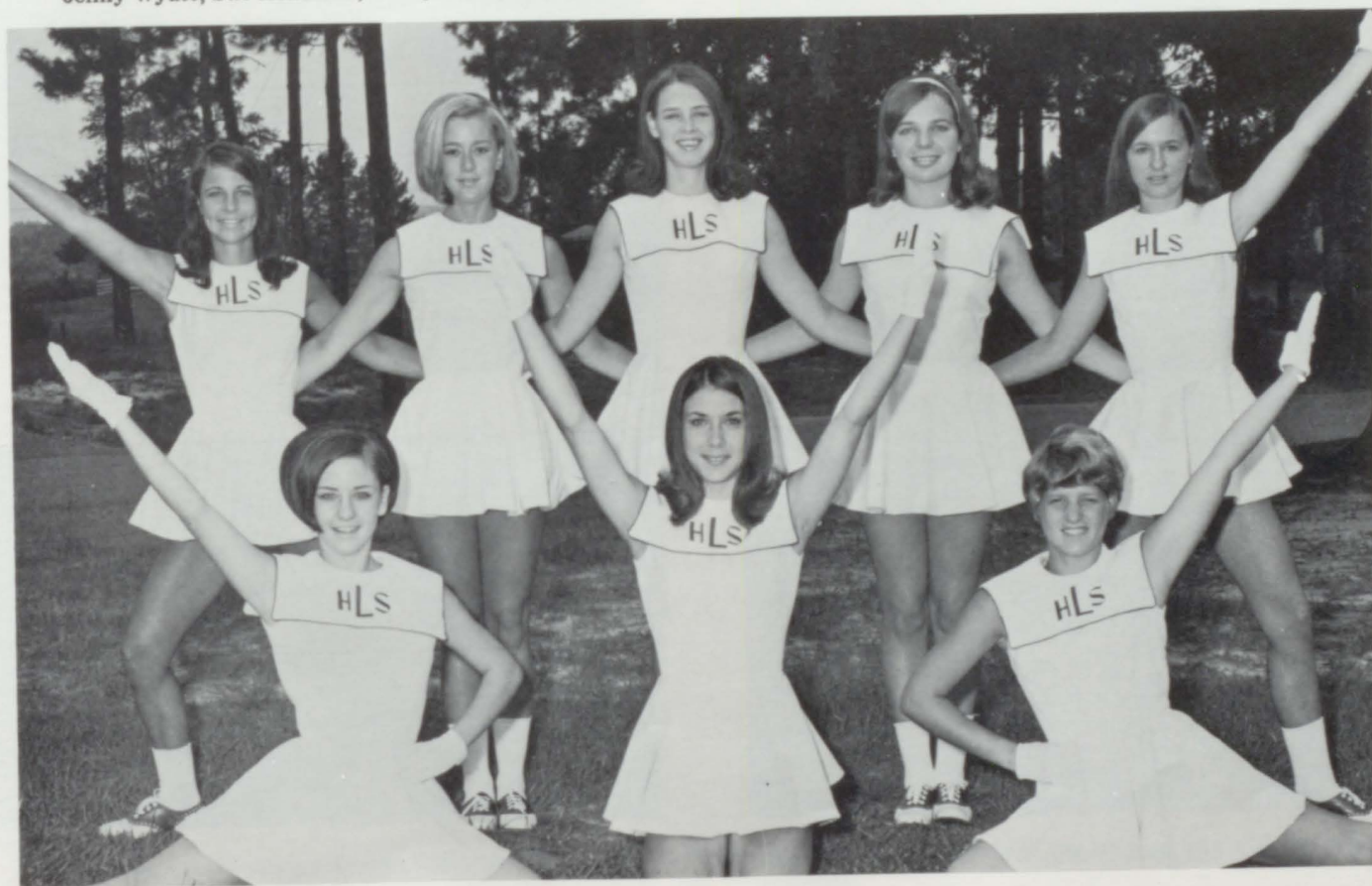

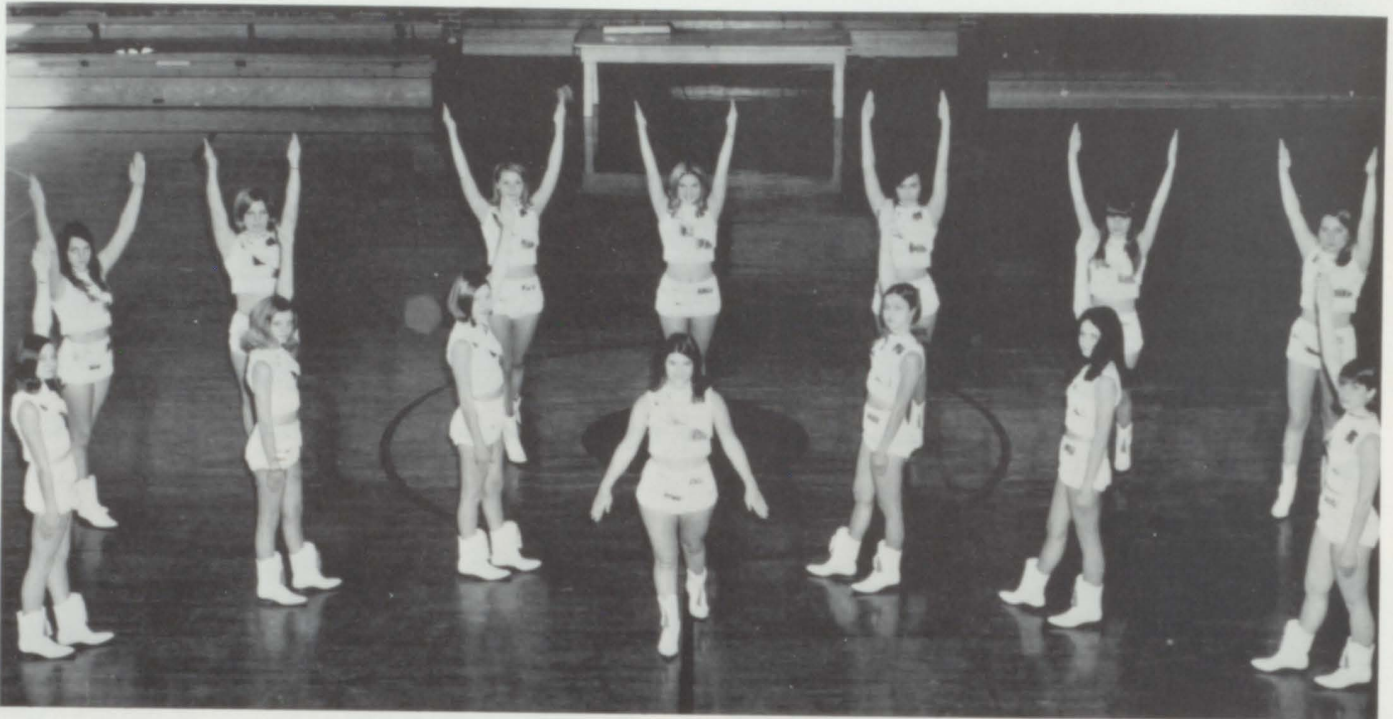

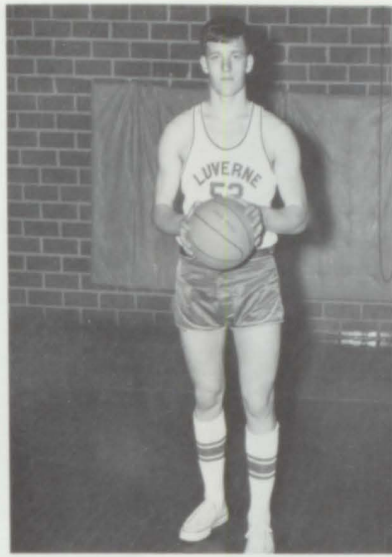

Through many weeks of diligent planning and hard work the beauty pageant ended with "Those Were The Days."



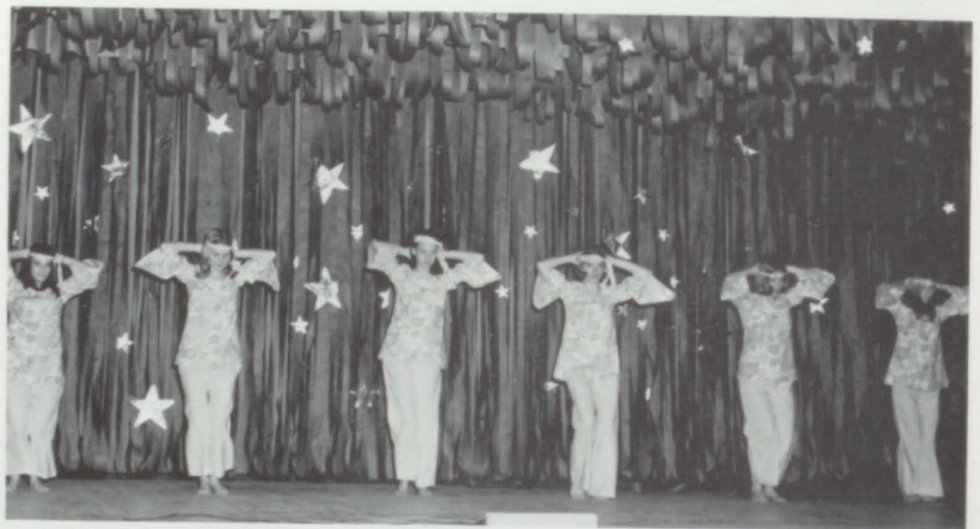

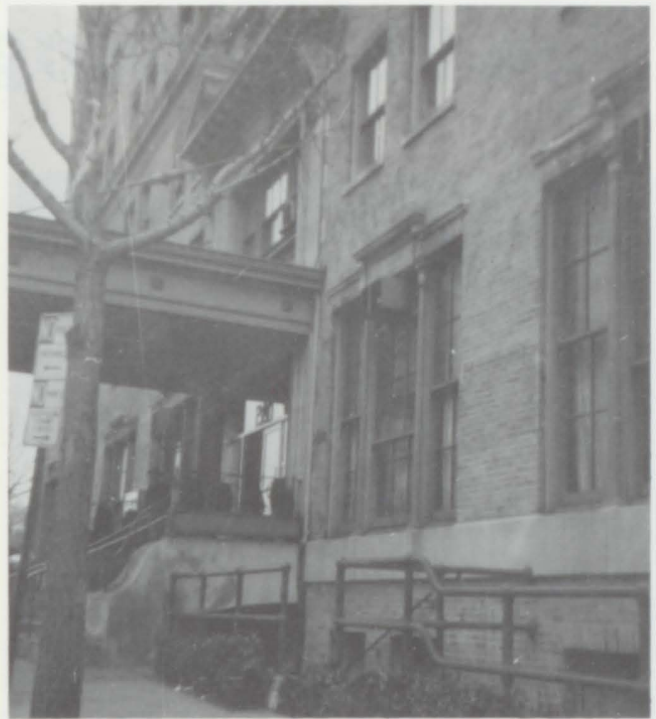
LHS Students Tour Washington, D.C., New York, and Williamsburg

The Sophomore year is one of experiencing new ideas and better ways of learning. The students have just become members of the superior world of high school, which is a role that gives them much pride.

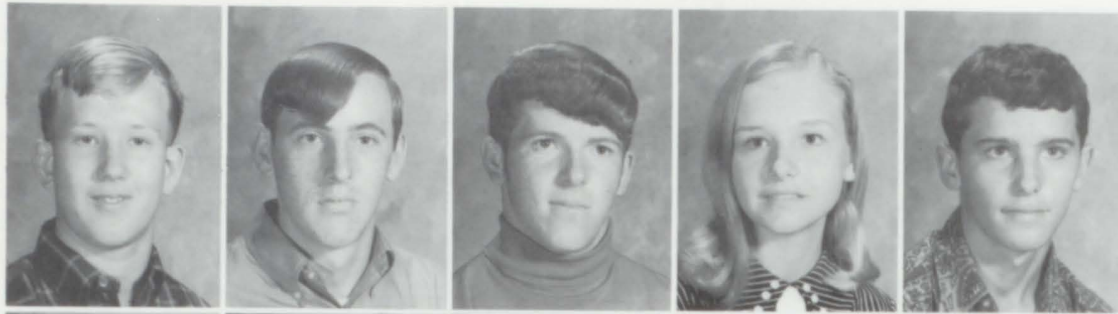
It is at this point that these students are allowed the privilege of participating in the beauty elections, the elections of homecoming queen, and varsity cheerleaders.
