



Even with our periods of disappointments, we have truly been like a balloon in a gusty wind, . . . rising to the top.









The spirit contest poster tells the story of this group of seniors with their variety of eyes.



















At the movies, Sylvester Stallone starred in "First Blood" and "Rocky III", while Dustin Hoffman starred in "Tootsie". An oddly enduring little alien gave us all a sense of magic, wonder, and the phrase "E.T. phone home!" "E.T." went on to become one of the most popular movies of all time.

This was also the year of the birth of England's future King, Prince William Arthur Phillip Louis.




TOMORROW'S EDUCATORS
















